Attentive to the Word

Fifth Sunday after Pentecost Romans 10: 1-10 Matthew 8:28 - 9:1

The Gospel today has a strange ending: "Jesus, leave. Jesus, please don't stay. Jesus, we don't want you here." For us this sounds strange. It's the wrong ending. The people should have been happy. The two men were restored to right living. They were brought back into the human family, not isolated and violent and dangerous. Jesus makes us all take sides. Do we want Jesus in our lives? Are we willing to accept Him? Are we willing to change? I remember a man who was a terrible alcoholic. He would work hard, get paid and get drunk. He finally came to the conclusion by God's grace that this was not the way to live. He went to AA, became sober, and became a new man. But since he was no longer drunk all the time, he began to notice things that were wrong in the family that never before bothered him. He started to see things in a whole new way and to recognize that a lot of changes had to be made for his family to be healthy in the way they lived and dealt with life. His wife complained: "I liked you better when you were a drunk because you were so unaware of everything else that was wrong." When God makes changes in one's personal life we have to change but then we recognize and see that everybody else 22 23 also has to change and grow, and sometimes people can't accept that. They would rather leave things as they are: "Jesus leave! Jesus don't bother us. Jesus go away." There was a university professor who went searching for the meaning of life. After several years and with many miles, he came to the hut of a particularly holy hermit and asked to be enlightened. The holy man invited his visitor into his humble dwelling and began to serve him tea. He filled the pilgrim's cup and then kept on pouring so that tea was soon dripping onto the floor. The professor watched the overflow until he could no longer of things that are obstacles that get in the way of God acting in our lives. His grace changes us, renews and restores us. But sometimes we would just rather keep what we already know and make no room for God. There is a story about a rich man who entered a village and called all the poor people together in the town square. He told them that he wanted to share his wealth with them by giving each person enough money to help begin a new life. Some of the poor people rushed forward, grateful to the rich man and eager to accept his great gift. Those who knew this man were not surprised, since they realized

how generous he was and that he asked for little in return. Others of the village, however, said that there were some strings attached to this gift. No one gives away something without hoping for something in return. They accused the rich man of using his wealth for the sake of controlling others and they refused to take any of his wealth. When the rich man left that village, some of the people were ready to begin a new life, while others, who mistrusted the rich man, had condemned themselves to a life of suffering in poverty and hunger God opens up to us his mercy, his foreiveness, his Love. He restores us to grace.

restrain himself. "Stop! It's full. No more will go in." "Like this cup," said the hermit, "you are full of your own opinions, preconceptions, and ideas. How can I teach you unless you first empty your cup?" Our life of faith is like that. We have to let go of a lot

to life, to integrity – but we have to accept His love and mercy and forgiveness. The Sacred Scripture ends with the words, "Come Lord Jesus." Come Lord Jesus into my life. Come Lord and bless me. Come Lord Jesus and restore, forgive and protect me. Come Lord Jesus my Savior. I welcome you. I invite you. I want you. Come Lord Jesus.
