Attentive to the Word

Sunday of the Prodigal Son 1 Corinthians 6: 12-20 Luke 15: 11-32

During the several weeks which immediately preced the beginning of Lent, the Church helps us prepare for the great period of repentance which will eventually lead us to the brilliance and joy of Pascha, the Mystery of the Resurrection. For several consecutive Sundays before Lent, the gospel readings at the Divine Liturgy point out several aspects of our spiritual journey toward the beginning of Lent. We hear of Zacchaeus who was so anxious to see what Christ was like, that he climbed to the top of a sycamore tree in order just to catch a glimpse of Jesus as he moved through the crowd. As the words of the gospel story etch themselves in our hearts, we are called to reflect upon our own desire to see what Christ is really like, and to examine our ways of trying to catch a glimpse of Jesus. Likewise, on following Sundays, we hear stories which point toward humility, love, justice and forgiveness, all of which sum up the attitude of repentance and expectation with which we approach Lent. We ore asked to be attentive to the gospel as it is proclaimed to us, and to let the Word, as relayed through the parables and teaching of Christ, form our hearts and minds appropriately in order that being spiritualized, we may eventually share in the victory of Christ's resurrection. The parables and stories we hear during these weeks are helps along the way. By them, we are given the grace to understand the parable of our own lives, and the story of others around us, as we all try to catch a glimpse of Christ moving among us, remembering the many times he has called to us as he did to Zacchaeus, and helped us on our way.

The third Sunday proceeding Lent is the Sunday of the Prodigal Son. This is the parable telling the story of a young man who, upon receiving his father's inheritance early, decides to leave home, live a life disconnected from those who love him as well as from morality, squandering all of his inheritance on whimsical fancies. After having been reduced to a state beneath the dignity of a beggar through his own choices, he remembers

that his father's household still offers him the possibility of a home. But because of his deeds, he is ashamed to return home. Finally, he does decide to return home as a beggar, repenting before his father for having squandered his inheritance. Much to his surprise (as well as to his brother's surprise), his father is waiting for his return with open arms. The father, instead of disowning him, throws his arms around him and the two are reconciled. A great celebration then occurs in the household.

The parable of the prodigal son illustrates a position in which we often find ourselves. Often, through the choices we make, we become alienated from God, the Church, those we love and ourselves. We find ourselves in exile from our home; that place where the Lord, ourselves, and our loved ones dwell. It is often difficult for us to return to that home because of fear and shame. Yet, the point of the parable is that the Father's mercy always welcomes us back, and in as much as we are to take the risks involved in returning home in a spirit of humble repentance, so are we also to practice the mercy of the Father in welcoming home those who have offended us. To be forgiven we must lift our hearts and minds from whatever oppresses us and direct them to the Father, who waits for us with open arms. We must be willing to take the first steps home. We must be willing to climb the sycamore tree to catch a glimpse of Jesus.

So as Lent approaches, we may listen to the gospel readings during these preceding weeks and allow the words to relate to our lives, as Joe did to his. In one way or another, we find our exiled selves in need of the Father's warm embrace. May we search the Word of God for the grace and consolation to take advantage of the Lenten journey, making it our journey home. May we be delightfully surprised to find that, no matter how far we have strayed, the Lord awaits us with open arms. And, like Joe and the prodigal son, may we experience the joy of reunion with the Lord, with each other as family, and with the entire Church so that at the end of Lent, we may celebrate the Victory of Life over the defeat of darkness, sadness, and despair. Amen.

Mystery of Reconciliation: Celebrated Saturdays, 4:00 PM - 4:30 PM and upon request.

Mystery of Anointing: Celebrated upon request. Ideally celebrated in Church the Sunday before undergoing any surgical or other medical procedure.

Visitation of the Sick: The parishioners confined to their homes or nursing homes due to health reasons are visited monthly. Also, persons who are hospitalized are visited when Fr. Andrew is notified. It especially is important that a family member contact Fr. Andrew whenever a loved-one is hospitalized.

Funerals: Families of the deceased or the funeral director must contact Fr. Andrew before
