Attentive to the Word

Fourth Sunday of the Great Fast Hebrews 6: 13-20 Mark 9: 17-31

When our Lord and His three friends returned to the other nine disciples, they found them involved in a dual problem: they were unable to deliver a boy from demonic control, and the scribes were debating with them and perhaps even taunting them because of their failure. As always, it was Jesus who stepped in to solve the problem.

The boy was both deaf and dumb (Mark 9:17, 25), and the demon was doing his best to destroy him. Imagine what it would be like for that father to try to care for the boy and protect him! Jesus had given His disciples authority to cast out demons (Mark 6:7, 13), and yet their ministry to the boy was ineffective. No wonder the Lord was grieved with them! How often He must be grieved with us when we fail to use the spiritual resources He has graciously given to His people!

Since the disciples had failed, the desperate father was not even sure that Jesus could succeed; hence his statement, "If you can do anything" (Mark 9:22, NASB). However, the father was honest enough to admit his own unbelief and to ask the Lord to help him and his son. Jesus did cast out the demon and restore the boy to his father.

The main lesson of this miracle is the power of faith to overcome the enemy (Mark 9:19, 23-24; and see Matt. 17:20). Why had the nine disciples failed? Because they had been careless in their personal spiritual walk and had neglected prayer and fasting (Mark 9:29). The authority that Jesus had given them was effective only if exercised by faith, but faith must be cultivated through spiritual discipline and devotion. It may be that the absence of their Lord, or His taking the three disciples with Him and leaving them behind, had dampened their spiritual fervor and diminished their faith. Not only did their failure embarrass them, but it also robbed the Lord of glory and gave the enemy opportunity to criticize. It is our faith in Him that glorifies God (Rom. 4:20).

SAINT JOHN CLIMACUS

We know little about the life of John, the Hegumen of the Monastery of Mt. Sinai, but he has left us one of the greatest spiritual testimonies of the Christian faith, his work called the "Ladder of Virtues." It was written, certainly, in a monastic environment, which has always been the home for the seeking of perfection as commanded by Christ: "So be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect. (Matthew 5:48)" His book, then, was read in Eastern monasteries during the Great Fast. Though his work was for monks, each of us has a vocation common with monks to seek perfection in Christ, and so we can all profit from his work. He reminds us that sanctification is not instant, but it is a lifetime project, "All of us, gazing with unveiled face on the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, as from the Lord who is the Spirit. (2 Corinthians 3:18)" This is what our Father John teaches us: "The Christian is one who imitates Christ in thought, word and deed, as far as is possible for human

beings, believing rightly and blamelessly in the Holy Trinity." (Step 1, Section 4) "Having heard the Gospel of the Lord, O venerable Father John, you left this world, counting as nothing the riches and glory that it offered. Then you cried out to everyone: Love the Lord and you shall find eternal favor, for nothing is preferable to his love. And when he shall come in glory, you will find repose with all the saints. Through their prayers, O Christ, grant mercy to our souls." (Doxasticheron at Psalm 140, Vespers of the Fourth Sunday of the Great Fast)

FEAST OF THE ANNUNCIATION

Years ago, when underground coal-mining was at its peak, coal miners would spend long days in dark, damp mines carved deep within the earth. To light their path in the dark they wore kerosene lanterns attached to their helmets. The small lantern did not illuminate the entire underground mine, it only provided enough light for the miners to see just a few feet ahead. With each step the miner took, the light moved with him, providing only enough light for a few steps at a time.

The same is true with God. He does not provide all the answers nor does He remove all "the mystery of life at once. Rather, God gives us enough light for one step, which we take with faith and trust in Him. As we take that step, God then provides us with enough light to take another step. This is the essence of trusting God.

The Mother of God provides us with a profound example of trust in God. When the Angel Gabriel announced to Mary that she was selected to be the Mother of God, he did not outline each of the steps that she would have to face along the way. Nor did he inform her how she was to give birth as a virgin. All she could do was say "yes," and trust God each step of the way.

When facing the unknowns in our life, may we turn to God with the same faith and trust as Mary, and say as she did, "Let it be done to me according to Your word." (Luke 1:38)

Saint John the Baptist Byzantine Catholic Cathedral is a member of the Byzantine Catholic Metropolitan Church of Pittsburgh who through the Holy Spirit is called to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Mysteries of Initiation (Baptism, Chrismation & Eucharist): Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Pre-baptism instructions are required. Contact Fr. Andrew to schedule.

Mystery of Crowning: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Must meet with Fr. Andrew before setting date and reserving your banquet hall. Pre-Cana program is required and three sessions with Fr. Andrew. The ceremony will be celebrated according to the prescription of the liturgical book of the Byzantine rite.

Mystery of Reconciliation: Celebrated Saturdays, 4:00 PM - 4:30 PM and upon request.

Mystery of Anointing: Celebrated upon request. Ideally celebrated in Church the Sunday before undergoing any surgical or other medical procedure.

<u>Visitation of the Sick:</u> The parishioners confined to their homes or nursing homes due to health reasons are visited monthly. Also, persons who are hospitalized are visited when Fr. Andrew is notified. It especially is important that a family member contact Fr. Andrew whenever a loved-one is hospitalized.

Funerals: Families of the deceased or the funeral director must contact Fr. Andrew before setting and publishing the day and time of the funeral.

Parish Membership: We welcome anyone to become a parishioner of St. John the Baptist Cathedral Parish. Only those who are registered are considered members of the Parish. When one registers to become a parish member they assume the responsibility of rendering stewardship of time, talent and treasure to this parish family. Worship at this parish is always expected. Registration is done only through the pastor by appointment. The Parish Office should be notified as soon as possible of any change of address within the Parish as well as one's leaving.

Godparent/Sponsor Letters: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish.
