Attentive to the Word

Palm (Flowery) Sunday Philippians 4: 4-9 John 12: 1-18

The Byzantine Church concludes the forty days of Lenten fasting on Lazarus Saturday as to emerge from the tomb with Lazarus. The Scriptural texts for Palm Sunday ring an insistent note of joy. Yesterday, we celebrated the raising of Lazarus as a sign and a promise of Christ's life giving power. Today the Church celebrates Christ's arrival in Jerusalem as Messiah and King of Israel. In this moment, we recognize that God has kept and even surpassed His ancient promises.

In Genesis 49,1-11, we hear one of the Old Testament texts which nourished Israel's hopes for a Messiah. The Patriarch Jacob's dying prophecy for his son Judah, from whom King David and Jesus both descend, promises eternal kingship in mysterious symbolic language. With hindsight, the Church can say: "he washed his garments in wine, and his clothes in the blood of grapes" (Genesis 49,11) as a foreshadowing of His Passion and death, and can hear in "he lies down as a lion, as a lion who shall rouse him?" (Genesis 49,9) the paradox of the all-powerful God surrendering to death and rising from the dead.

Hints of the saving death and Resurrection are also found in Zephaniah 3, 14-19. Here the prophet speaks to Jerusalem, reassuring her that "the Lord has removed the judgment against you, he has turned away your enemies. The King of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst, you have no further misfortune to fear." The prophet Zechariah likewise invites Jerusalem to rejoice: "See, your king shall come to you; a just savior is he, meek and riding on an ass, on a colt, the foal of an ass" (Zechariah 9,9). The donkey, a rather unregal beast who also makes an appearance in Genesis 49,11 and the Gospel accounts of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem (John 12, 1-17), is explained by Zechariah 9,10. The Messiah will not be like other earthly kings: horse-riding, chariot-driving, sword-wielding, power-mongering; rather, the Messiah "will proclaim peace to the nations." Here too, we find a hint of Christ's descent into Hades to raise up fallen human nature: "As for you, for the blood of your covenant with me, I will bring up your prisoners from the dungeon" (Zechariah 9,11). In Zephaniah 3,19, the same gentle king promises, "I will deal with all who oppress you: I will save the lame and the outcast."

The arrival of such a King, whose hallmarks are peace and gentleness and healing, is indeed a cause for rejoicing. These themes are repeated in St. Paul's Epistle to the Philippians (4,4-9) but the emphasis changes: we must imitate what we see in Christ our King: "Let your gentleness be known to all...and the peace of Christ which surpasses all understanding will

guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus...Keep on doing what you have learned and received and heard and seen in me. Then the peace of God will be with you.

The Gospels of the Entry into Jerusalem (Matthew 21 at Matins, John 12 at the Divine Liturgy), remind us that not everyone rejoiced when Jesus entered Jerusalem. While the children waved their palm branches and spread out their cloaks and cried "Hosanna to the Son of David!" the scribes and Pharisees fumed indignantly on the sidelines. This was not the Messiah they, wanted and they were in no hurry to surrender their own power to the healer of the poor riding on His donkey. So blinded by their own interests were they that they even plotted to kill Lazarus (John 12,10) as if they could take back the gift of life Christ had given His beloved friend!

Even though every Scripture reading for Palm Sunday commands us to "rejoice;" a darker thread is woven through these texts as well. The humble Prince of Peace on the donkey still comes as King and Lord and Judge and every other claim to authority and power must surrender to Him.

The program will begin at 2:00 p.m. with the Choir's joyful presentation "Sing the Hymn of Victory!" featuring many beloved and seldom-heard renditions of the Paschal greeting, "Christ is Risen! Christos Voskrese!" A hospitality reception will follow the program in the lower level of the church.

Mission Statement

Saint John the Baptist Byzantine Catholic Cathedral is a member of the Byzantine Catholic Metropolitan Church of Pittsburgh who through the Holy Spirit is called to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ. As a community and family, we grow in faith and in the image and likeness of God by dedicating ourselves to welcoming, celebrating and caring for all of God's people.

Mysteries of Initiation (Baptism, Chrismation & Eucharist): Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Pre-baptism instructions are required. Contact Fr. Andrew to schedule.

Mystery of Crowning: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Must meet with Fr. Andrew before setting date and reserving your banquet hall. Pre-Cana program is required and three sessions with Fr. Andrew. The ceremony will be celebrated according to the prescription of the liturgical book of the Byzantine rite.

Mystery of Reconciliation: Celebrated Saturdays, 4:00 PM - 4:30 PM and upon request.

Mystery of Anointing: Celebrated upon request. Ideally celebrated in Church the Sunday before undergoing any surgical or other medical procedure.

<u>Visitation of the Sick:</u> The parishioners confined to their homes or nursing homes due to health reasons are visited monthly. Also, persons who are hospitalized are visited when Fr. Andrew is notified. It especially is important that a family member contact Fr. Andrew whenever a loved-one is hospitalized.

Funerals: Families of the deceased or the funeral director must contact Fr. Andrew before setting and publishing the day and time of the funeral.

Parish Membership: We welcome anyone to become a parishioner of St. John the Baptist Cathedral Parish. Only those who are registered are considered members of the Parish. When one registers to become a parish member they assume the responsibility of rendering stewardship of time, talent and treasure to this parish family. Worship at this parish is always expected. Registration is done only through the pastor by appointment. The Parish Office should be notified as soon as possible of any change of address within the Parish as well as one's leaving.

Godparent/Sponsor Letters: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish.

Rectory Office Hours: Judy is in the parish office Monday – Friday from 9:00 AM - 2 PM. Father Andrew is available on other days and times by appointment.
