Attentive to the Word



During Lent, one of my students gave up complaining "on Tuesdays and Wednesdays." Despite my comments that he should give this up every day, he persisted in this Lenten penance, perhaps being honest with himself about his struggles in this area. Lent is over, but that should not mean an end to sacrifices until next year. While we rejoice greatly in the triumph of Easter, and from that joy should flow a spirit of celebration, a spirit of sacrifice should also remain part of our lives as Christians always. This sacrifice might not consist in giving up sweets or coffee, but rather in living the demands of our Christian lives and vocations with an ever-increasing charity, a love which is more and more self-giving. I recently watched the movie The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe with my students after our study of the novel. One line that particularly struck me, slightly adjusted from the book, occurred when the White Witch was about to kill Aslan, the Christ-figure of the story. Mocking him by pointing out his supposed foolishness for sacrificing his life for Edmund, only to give her the possibility of killing him as well, the Witch says sarcastically, "So much for love." Even the White Witch knew that sacrifice and love always go together. What she could not see was the point, the meaning, the value of that loving sacrifice. Aslan, on the other hand, saw that a freely given sacrifice of "a willing victim in a traitor's stead" was powerful enough that "even death itself would turn backwards." This is the love of our God! This is the love that has conquered sin and death! We sinners are the traitors, and He is the "willing victim" whose sacrificial love brought meaning and purpose not only to His sufferings but even to our own. This Easter, we rejoice in the triumph of His self-giving love over death itself. The Song of Songs in the Old Testament tells us that "love is strong as death" (Song 8:6b). And yet, in the New Covenant; we see that Love is even stronger than death. God, who is love (1 John 4:8b), does not allow death to have the last word, but taking it on Himself, He utterly defeats it. He has truly risen, and He alone has the victory! Yet that glorious resurrection would not have happened had it not been for the sacrifice of His own life that we might live with Him forever. "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13). His sacrifice for us is the greatest love possible. So let us return love for love. To Our Lord who has so loved us, let us respond through our daily lives with an emphatic, "I love You, too!" Through the way we live, let us give everything in love for Him. Are we willing to sacrifice even when it is difficult, knowing that our God can and will bring meaning and purpose to our self-gift? Or like my student, will we give in to the tendency to set limits on how much or how often we are willing to give ourselves to God, allowing ourselves to hold onto what we think we cannot possibly sacrifice? This Easter and throughout our lives, let us choose to live in the life-giving spirit of sacrificial love for and with our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Mission Statement

Saint John the Baptist Byzantine Catholic Cathedral is a member of the Byzantine Catholic Metropolitan Church of Pittsburgh who through the Holy Spirit is called to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ. As a community and family, we grow in faith and in the image and likeness of God by dedicating ourselves to welcoming, celebrating and caring for all of God's people.

Mysteries of Initiation (Baptism, Chrismation & Eucharist): Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Pre-baptism instructions are required. Contact Fr. Andrew to schedule.

Mystery of Crowning: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Must meet with Fr. Andrew before setting date and reserving your banquet hall. Pre-Cana program is required and three sessions with Fr. Andrew. The ceremony will be celebrated according to the prescription of the liturgical book of the Byzantine rite.

Mystery of Reconciliation: Celebrated Saturdays, 4:00 PM - 4:30 PM and upon request.

Mystery of Anointing: Celebrated upon request. Ideally celebrated in Church the Sunday before undergoing any surgical or other medical procedure.

<u>Visitation of the Sick:</u> The parishioners confined to their homes or nursing homes due to health reasons are visited monthly. Also, persons who are hospitalized are visited when Fr. Andrew is notified. It especially is important that a family member contact Fr. Andrew whenever a loved-one is hospitalized.

Funerals: Families of the deceased or the funeral director must contact Fr. Andrew before setting and publishing the day and time of the funeral.

Parish Membership: We welcome anyone to become a parishioner of St. John the Baptist Cathedral Parish. Only those who are registered are considered members of the Parish. When one registers to become a parish member they assume the responsibility of rendering stewardship of time, talent and treasure to this parish family. Worship at this parish is always expected. Registration is done only through the pastor by appointment. The Parish Office should be notified as soon as possible of any change of address within the Parish as well as one's leaving.

Godparent/Sponsor Letters: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish.

Rectory Office Hours: Judy is in the parish office Monday – Friday from 9:00 AM - 2 PM. Father Andrew is available on other days and times by appointment.
