Attentive to the Word

Thomas Sunday Acts 5: 12-20 John 20: 19-31

When two persons are born at the same time who have the same mother and father, we call them twins. There are two kinds of twins: identical twins and fraternal twins. Identical twins are of the same sex and look very similar. Fraternal twins may be of the same sex or one may be male and the other female, but they usually do not look alike. Whether the two are identical or fraternal, we call them twins.

The Gospel today tells us that Thomas means "Twin." Have we ever wondered who Thomas' twin was? Before we can answer that question, it would help us to look at what kind of person Thomas was. Then we might get a clue as to whom his twin is. Thomas has suffered from bad press. Doubting Thomas is the label attached to a person who did not so much doubt Jesus' resurrection, as someone who just wanted to be shown. After probing the nail-prints in Jesus' hands, and putting his hand into Jesus' side, Thomas will believe. We might say that Thomas is the precursor of modem scientific methods. One week later, Thomas has his chance. The subject is present; Thomas can observe, investigate, and reach a conclusion.

Does Thomas probe the nail-prints in Jesus' hands or the wound in His side? No! The Gospel leads us to believe he does not touch Jesus, even though Jesus invites him to do so. Thomas sees and believes. And he shouts, "My Lord and my God." Notice: Thomas never got his proof, at least not scientific proof. Thomas believed. Thomas reveals some interesting things to us about ourselves.

We live in a scientific world which says prove it. It is not so much that we doubt; it's just that we want proof. We want proof that a certain car will get 40 miles per gallon of gasoline. It is not that we doubt that it will not. But, testing and writing a 200-page report - which we will probably never read - cataloguing the results, will prove to us that it will get 40 miles per gallon. "The president is losing his popularity," says the reporter

on the evening news. And we unconsciously say, "Prove it." Before we can take our next breath, the survey results of the latest opinion poll are flashed across the TV screen. There we have it. The poll proves that the president is losing his popularity. "This TV set is guaranteed for eight years," states the salesperson. It is satisfaction guaranteed or we get our money back. We get the written guarantee and file it with our important papers. The guarantee proves that the salesperson is telling us the truth. There are many other ways in which we want proof. Our scientific world has created a scientific mind for each one of us. Unless everything is proved, we will not believe it.

But here we are, gathered together in this room, like the disciples of old. Not one of us has ever seen Jesus. Jesus has not appeared here and displayed His nail-marks and wounds and invited us to believe. We have no proof that He was raised from the dead. But is proof necessary? Does the scientific method apply to faith? No, it does not. Not one of us has seen the risen Lord, yet we believe.

Deep down in our hearts we may be coming to see who Thomas' twin is. The Gospel never tells us who Thomas' twin is for a reason. And the reason is simple - each of us is twin to Thomas. We doubt. We want proof. But ultimately we believe without proof. Thomas became a believer. Likewise, we twins come to believe. Faith is believing in a God who raised Jesus from the dead. The scientific method will not work. No one can prove - not even Thomas - that Jesus was raised from the dead. All we can do is believe - or choose not to believe. If we choose not to believe, then we merely forget it and go our merry way. However, if we choose to believe, we can say with certainty that Thomas' long lost twin has been found!

Mission Statement

Saint John the Baptist Byzantine Catholic Cathedral is a member of the Byzantine Catholic Metropolitan Church of Pittsburgh who through the Holy Spirit is called to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Pre-Cana program is required and three sessions with Fr. Andrew. The ceremony will be celebrated according to the prescription of the liturgical book of the Byzantine rite.

Mystery of Reconciliation: Celebrated Saturdays, 4:00 PM - 4:30 PM and upon request.

Mystery of Anointing: Celebrated upon request. Ideally celebrated in Church the Sunday before undergoing any surgical or other medical procedure.

<u>Visitation of the Sick:</u> The parishioners confined to their homes or nursing homes due to health reasons are visited monthly. Also, persons who are hospitalized are visited when Fr. Andrew is notified. It especially is important that a family member contact Fr. Andrew whenever a loved-one is hospitalized.

Funerals: Families of the deceased or the funeral director must contact Fr. Andrew before setting and publishing the day and time of the funeral.

Parish Membership: We welcome anyone to become a parishioner of St. John the Baptist Cathedral Parish. Only those who are registered are considered members of the Parish. When one registers to become a parish member they assume the responsibility of rendering stewardship of time, talent and treasure to this parish family. Worship at this parish is always expected. Registration is done only through the pastor by appointment. The Parish Office should be notified as soon as possible of any change of address within the Parish as well as one's leaving.

Godparent/Sponsor Letters: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish.

Rectory Office Hours: Judy is in the parish office Monday – Friday from 9:00 AM – 2 PM. Father Andrew is available on other days and times by appointment.
