Attentive to the Word

Ninth Sunday after Pentecost 1 Corinthians 3: 9-17 Matthew 14: 22-34

The Master wrote this instruction in his Rule: "If we desire to dwell in [the Heavenly] kingdom, we must run to it by our good deeds; otherwise we shall never arrive there...Such persons, fearing the Lord, do not pride themselves upon their good observance; rather, aware that what is good in themselves cannot be their own doing but the Lord's, they magnify the Lord working in them" (R.M. Theme, 18, 25-26). The story of Peter walking on the water with Jesus is likewise well known. Some people are quick to ridicule Peter for his lack of faith. Strangely, they tend to overlook the fact that the other eleven disciples never got out of the boat. Peter was the only one to get out of the boat and walk toward Jesus on the water.

Borrowing from other sections of the Bible, one could recreate the dialogue between Peter and Jesus, something like this. Still clinging to the gunwales, Peter says to Jesus, "Okay, Master, I'm getting out of this boat because you told me to come to you. Now, what are you going to do for me?" (Cf. Mk. 10: 28) Perhaps, Jesus smiled and said, "Peter, you have got to let go of the boat and remember that you are not setting out on any ordinary journey. (PAUSE) That's right! Now that you have left the comfort and security of your boat, keep walking towards me. You remember what happened to Lot's wife. Don't look back" (cf. Lk. 9: 62).

Have you ever wondered what is wrong with the human psyche? As soon as someone tells us not to do something, we go ahead and do it? Let me give you a few examples: Adam and Eve in paradise (Gen. 3); Lot's wife at the gates of Zoar (Gen. 19: 26); the Hebrew slaves at Massah in the desert (Ex. 17:3). As soon as Jesus said, "Don't turn around," Peter looked back.

With that glance he noticed how far and he was from the boat. Only then did he become aware of the force of the wind that had been blowing all the while (cf. Mat. 14: 30). He had lost sight of his goal and began to sink beneath the waves. Certainly, the words of David could easily be quoted here, "The waves of death encircled me ... In my distress I called to the Lord" (2 Sam. 22: 5, 7). Just as the waters were rising to his neck (cf. Ps. 69: 1), Jesus stretched out his hand and took hold of his disciple (cf. Mat. 14: 31). Recall the words of the prophet Isaiah, "The hand of the Lord is not too short to save, nor is his ear too dull to hear" (Is. 59: 1).

friend of mine wrote about a swimming lesson he had received. "Will would gently pull me farther out in the water, put his strong hand under my belly and float me around the pond as he swam, assuring me, 'Relax, boy. One day you'll trust enough to know that you were created to float. Since trust can't be rushed, will play" (A Boy, A Man and a Meteorite, Roger Robbennolt).

God carried His people close to His heart throughout their sojourn in the desert

The image of Jesus stretching out his hand to Peter reminds me of another story. A

(cf. Deut. 1: 31). God Incarnate stretched out His mighty right arm to His disciples in their times of distress. Do we trust God enough to cry out for help? Are we humble and honest enough to admit that we cannot survive without His help?

Let us call to the Lord when we are in trouble, and then listen for His loving response (cf. Ps. 86: 6). Like the disciples of old, we will hear Him say, "Courage! It is I! Do not be afraid" (Mat. 14: 27). "Know that I am with you always; yes, to the end of time" (Mat. 28: 20).

period of fast in honor of the Mother of God, the Virgin Mary. We, as Byzantine Catholics have a high regard for the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God, for her special role in the salvation of mankind. St. John of Damascus, one of the Church fathers, pointed out that when the Blessed Virgin Mary became the Mother of God and gave birth to Christ, the Redeemer of Mankind, she became the mother of mankind. We call the Virgin Mary "Theotokos", from the Greek, which means "The Birth-Giver or the Bearer of God." This is the highest title that can be bestowed upon any member of the human

During the first fourteen days of August during each year, our Church enters into a

Every year the Byzantine Church sets aside the first fourteen days of August in honor of the Virgin Mary. This fast period is climaxed on August 15th, when the Church gathers to celebrate the Great Feast of the Dormition (Falling-Asleep) of the Theotokos.

Let the peace and holiness that only the Mother of God can give you enter into your life. "Let us lay aside all earthly cares," and let us truly, during these fifteen days, participate in the fasting and prayer life of the Church so that we can "taste and see that the Lord is good" and so that we may fully experience the spiritual blessings that the

Mission Statement

Saint John the Baptist Byzantine Catholic Cathedral is a member of the Byzantine Catholic Metropolitan Church of Pittsburgh who through the Holy Spirit is called to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ. As a community and family, we grow in faith and in the image and likeness of God by dedicating ourselves to welcoming, celebrating and caring for all of God's people.

Mysteries of Initiation (Baptism, Chrismation & Eucharist): Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Pre-baptism instructions are required. Contact Fr. Andrew to schedule.

Mystery of Crowning: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Must meet with Fr. Andrew before setting date and reserving your banquet hall. Pre-Cana program is required and three sessions with Fr. Andrew. The ceremony will be celebrated according to the prescription of the liturgical book of the Byzantine rite.

Mystery of Reconciliation: Celebrated Saturdays, 4:00 PM - 4:30 PM and upon request.

Mystery of Anointing: Celebrated upon request. Ideally celebrated in Church the Sunday before undergoing any surgical or other medical procedure.

<u>Visitation of the Sick:</u> The parishioners confined to their homes or nursing homes due to health reasons are visited monthly. Also, persons who are hospitalized are visited when Fr. Andrew is notified. It especially is important that a family member contact Fr. Andrew whenever a loved-one is hospitalized.

Funerals: Families of the deceased or the funeral director must contact Fr. Andrew before setting and publishing the day and time of the funeral.

Parish Membership: We welcome anyone to become a parishioner of St. John the Baptist Cathedral Parish. Only those who are registered are considered members of the Parish. When one registers to become a parish member they assume the responsibility of rendering stewardship of time, talent and treasure to this parish family. Worship at this parish is always expected. Registration is done only through the pastor by appointment. The Parish Office should be notified as soon as possible of any change of address within the Parish as well as one's leaving.

Godparent/Sponsor Letters: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish.

Rectory Office Hours: Judy is in the parish office Monday – Friday from 8:30 AM – 1:30 PM. Father Andrew is available on other days and times by appointment.
