Feast of the Transfiguration 2 Peter 1: 10 - 19 Matthew 17: 1 - 9

There is one reason that the story of the Transfiguration is recorded in the gospels - to confirm our faith in Jesus as the Son of God. The Kontakion proclaims: "your disciples beheld as much of your glory as they could bear, that when they would see you crucified, they would understand that you suffered willingly; so they would preach to the world that you are truly the radiance of the Father." When the glory of God shone through our Lord, Moses and Elijah appeared at his side. Moses, because on Mt. Sinai he asked to see the glory of God, the Lord replied, "You cannot see my face, for no man can see my face and live. (Exodus33:20)" Yet now Peter, James and John could see the glory of God in the face of Jesus. Elijah experienced the glory of God on Mt. Horeb, but not in the power and violence of the wind, the earthquake and the fire, but in the gentle, whispering, quiet breeze (2 Kings 19:12)" incarnate in the Lord who would not break the bruised reed nor quench the smoking ember. (Matthew 12:20)" The disciples misunderstood the revelation, yet recorded it for our faith. The Father's voice proclaims, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased. Hear him!" The gospel today tells us what it means to be Christian, to hear the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to follow him in his gentleness, kindness, glory and love. And so we pray: "Master, Jesus Christ our God, lead us upon the all-holy mountain of love." (Ambon Prayer)

Psalm 8 reads: "What is man that you are mindful of him, and a son of man that you care for him? Yet you have made him little less than a god, crowned him with glory and honor. (vv 5-6)"

The Transfiguration tells us what the human being is from the viewpoint of God. Today, belief in God is challenged by many. To do this, however, we need to say that the only reality there is is the material world, what we can see and hear and touch and feel. Faith, though, goes beyond these limitations. Yet the mystery we celebrate today, breaks

into the material world, and the body of Jesus is visibly transformed by the Lord's divinity. The Gospel tells us, "he was transfigured before them; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light. (Matthew 17:2)" The sun is the sign of wisdom and knowledge, the white clothes a sign of perfection and purity. Moses and Elijah appear, for in the Old Law they both saw God's glory on a mountain, Moses on Mt. Sinai and Elijah on Mt. Horeb. The three disciples see God's glory now shining forth from a human body, a sign of our deification. In the later Second Letter of St. Peter, the author tells us that we become "sharers in the divine nature (1:4)" because " ... he received honor and glory from God the Father when that unique declaration came to him from the majestic glory, "This is my Son, my beloved, with whom I am well pleased." We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven while we were with him on the holy mountain. Today, we hear the Father's voice, we see the glory of God in his only-begotten Son, we see the cloud which represents the Holy Spirit. This appearance is to strengthen our faith, as the Kontakion proclaims, "your disciples beheld as much of your glory as they could bear, that when they would see you crucified, they would understand that you suffered willingly; so they would preach to the world that you are truly the radiance of the Father." The foolishness of the atheists is revealed, and St. John tells us, "what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we looked upon and touched with our hands concerns the Word of life - for the life was made visible; we have seen it and testify to it and proclaim to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was made visible to us (1 John 1:1-2)" St. Paul also teaches us, "At present we see indistinctly, as in a mirror, but then face to face. At present I know partially; then I shall know fully, as I am fully known. So faith, hope,

At present I know partially; then I shall know fully, as I am fully known. So faith, hope, love remain, these three; but the greatest of these is love. (1 Corinthians 13:12-13)" Perhaps we do not see God as clearly as the disciples did on Mount Tabor, but I believe there is a moment of Transfiguration in each of our lives, that moment when we realize that we have been transformed by faith, by hope and by love through the grace of God. In truth, we probably all have mystical moments, but God speaks very quietly, as to Elijah on Mt. Horeb, and the noise of the world can easily drown them out.

Mission Statement

Saint John the Baptist Byzantine Catholic Cathedral is a member of the Byzantine Catholic Metropolitan Church of Pittsburgh who through the Holy Spirit is called to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Mysteries of Initiation (Baptism, Chrismation & Eucharist): Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Pre-baptism instructions are required. Contact Fr. Andrew to schedule.

Mystery of Crowning: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Must meet with Fr. Andrew before setting date and reserving your banquet hall. Pre-Cana program is required and three sessions with Fr. Andrew. The ceremony will be celebrated according to the prescription of the liturgical book of the Byzantine rite.

Mystery of Reconciliation: Celebrated Saturdays, 4:00 PM - 4:30 PM and upon request.

Mystery of Anointing: Celebrated upon request. Ideally celebrated in Church the Sunday before undergoing any surgical or other medical procedure.

<u>Visitation of the Sick:</u> The parishioners confined to their homes or nursing homes due to health reasons are visited monthly. Also, persons who are hospitalized are visited when Fr. Andrew is notified. It especially is important that a family member contact Fr. Andrew whenever a loved-one is hospitalized.

Funerals: Families of the deceased or the funeral director must contact Fr. Andrew before setting and publishing the day and time of the funeral.

Parish Membership: We welcome anyone to become a parishioner of St. John the Baptist Cathedral Parish. Only those who are registered are considered members of the Parish. When one registers to become a parish member they assume the responsibility of rendering stewardship of time, talent and treasure to this parish family. Worship at this parish is always expected. Registration is done only through the pastor by appointment. The Parish Office should be notified as soon as possible of any change of address within the Parish as well as one's leaving.

Godparent/Sponsor Letters: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish.

Rectory Office Hours: Judy is in the parish office Monday – Friday from 8:30 AM – 1:30 PM. Father Andrew is available on other days and times by appointment.
