Nineteenth Sunday after Pentecost 2 Corinthians 11:31 - 12:9 Luke 7: 11-16

We are too often consumed by what we want God to do for us, rather than focusing on what God expects us to do for each other. Our national debate about our country's deficit always involves elements such as cutting entitlements, cutting programs for the poor, cutting medical care and more. Also debated are philosophies of additional spending to create more jobs and of raising taxes. Unfortunately all these debates take place in great halls, rallies and before cameras. Where they do not take place is in front of the people who stand to be hurt the most by our national need to do some serious belt tightening and fundraising.

This brings to mind the part of Charles Dickens's A Christmas Carol where Scrooge, still working in his counting house on Christmas Eve, was asked for a donation for the poor "at this festive season of the year." Furious, Scrooge told them that his taxes were supposed to take care of the poor. What many do not know is that Dickens had in mind the philosophy of Thomas Malthus, a very influential political economist of that day. In 1803, Malthus wrote an essay that led England to live in great fear of overpopulation. A student of Malthus, echoing Malthus, wrote that the poor "have no earthly right or business to be born." Too often we, like Scrooge, do not know who the poor are.

Jesus pointed us toward the poor and defenseless when he encountered a widow on the way to bury her only son. The woman was in dire circumstances. In the patriarchal society of the time, a woman enjoyed privileges only through her connections with a male relative. Jesus encountered a woman who was already a widow and whose only son was now dead. Because women could not own property, everything that was held for her by her son — house, money, goods, i.e., the inheritance — passed back to her deceased husband's family. This woman was now penniless and utterly alone. This is part of the reason that the Scriptures refer to the most destitute and vulnerable as "widows and orphans."

A most amazing thing occurs in Luke's Gospel. Jesus and the large crowd accompanying him had just arrived at the city gate when Jesus encountered the woman and discovered her plight. Luke tells us that Jesus was "was moved with pity for her."

Luke informs us that Jesus was not moved because the woman's son was dead. Jesus was moved because of the deeper suffering this woman was enduring and would endure for the rest of her life. Luke uses a word that we have come to use for "viscera," that is, our guts. Jesus was moved with compassion from the deepest part of his being. Here's the amazing part: no one asked anything of Jesus, no one said anything to Jesus. The amazing feature of this story, which is only in Luke's Gospel, is that Jesus acted completely on His own out of His compassion. Luke is sometimes called the Gospel of Social Justice. Luke knew well what Jesus taught, and he knew well what the Apostles taught as a consequence.

Like an early Dickens novel, Luke uses Jesus' teaching to expose the injustices of society, and to connect Jesus' teaching with right human behavior — behavior that should be characteristic of all those desiring to live in God's Kingdom. Luke interpreted the Kingdom not as something in the future; Luke saw being in the Church itself as being in the Kingdom. What Luke teaches us — the Church — is how to act.

Following the example of Jesus' compassion for the truly defenseless, we should be acting to fulfill God's desire for mercy and social justice. We should also realize how far Jesus went to express his compassion. He touched the funeral bier. Touching a dead body would have made Jesus ritually impure; therefore, he could not enter the synagogue for prayer or the Temple for sacrifice until he went through elaborate purification rituals. The act of making himself ritually impure would have seriously damaged Jesus' social status. What we witness is His complete disregard for His own status in order to act on behalf of someone who had no status whatsoever. Our economic troubles are serious indeed; but our debates about our economy must be guided by the compassion of God — the compassion we witness in Jesus. His compassion, which came from the depth of His being, is the compassion we are called to emulate in every aspect of life.

Mission Statement

Saint John the Baptist Byzantine Catholic Cathedral is a member of the Byzantine Catholic Metropolitan Church of Pittsburgh who through the Holy Spirit is called to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ. As a community and family, we grow in faith and in the image and likeness of God by dedicating ourselves to welcoming, celebrating and caring for all of God's people.

Mysteries of Initiation (Baptism, Chrismation & Eucharist): Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Pre-baptism instructions are required. Contact Fr. Andrew to schedule.

Mystery of Crowning: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family. Must meet with Fr. Andrew before setting date and reserving your banquet hall. Pre-Cana program is required and three sessions with Fr. Andrew. The ceremony will be celebrated according to the prescription of the liturgical book of the Byzantine rite.

Mystery of Reconciliation: Celebrated Saturdays, 4:00 PM - 4:30 PM and upon request.

<u>Mystery of Anointing:</u> Celebrated upon request. Ideally celebrated in Church the Sunday before undergoing any surgical or other medical procedure.

<u>Visitation of the Sick:</u> The parishioners confined to their homes or nursing homes due to health reasons are visited monthly. Also, persons who are hospitalized are visited when Fr. Andrew is notified. It especially is important that a family member contact Fr. Andrew whenever a loved-one is hospitalized.

Funerals: Families of the deceased or the funeral director must contact Fr. Andrew before setting and publishing the day and time of the funeral.

Parish Membership: We welcome anyone to become a parishioner of St. John the Baptist Cathedral Parish. Only those who are registered are considered members of the Parish. When one registers to become a parish member they assume the responsibility of rendering stewardship of time, talent and treasure to this parish family. Worship at this parish is always expected. Registration is done only through the pastor by appointment. The Parish Office should be notified as soon as possible of any change of address within the Parish as well as one's leaving.

Godparent/Sponsor Letters: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish.

Rectory Office Hours: Judy is in the parish office Monday – Friday from 8:30 AM - 1:30 PM. Father Andrew is available on other days and times by appointment.
