Attentive to the Word

Sunday after Theophany Ephesians 4: 7-13 Matthew 4: 12-17

We have now celebrated the Winter Pascha, the birth and the baptism of Christ. Having gone through all of this, we hear in today's Gospel how Jesus began his work. It was only a short reading, but there are two very particular points I would take from it.

First, that to begin his ministry, Jesus has to depart. He withdrew into Galilee. The only explanation that we are given for this in the reading from the Gospel of Matthew that we heard is that John the Baptist, his forerunner, has been put in prison, and presumably Jesus would have been next.

So, on one level, Jesus avoids the confrontation, as we all should: not putting ourselves in situations of conflict or temptation. This is what we pray: lead us not into temptation.

It is not that Jesus is unwilling to face temptations and dangers; he has, after all, just returned from battling with the devil in the desert. But he had been led into the desert by the Spirit in order to do battle there; we should not seek out such conflicts, but we can also be sure that we will be led into struggles.

In the case of Jesus today, now is not the time for another battle. He has work to do; the time for the ultimate battle and final victory will come later.

There is another more profound level why Jesus departs: it is indicated by the fact that he moves from his hometown, Nazareth, to Capernaum, in the Galilee of the Gentiles. The point is made in the other Gospels, and it has become a standard saying, that a prophet is without honor in his own country. But this means that Jesus begins his preaching about the Kingdom after being rejected in his own country.

What does this mean for us? It is easy to think we are simply the heirs of what he began: he preached the Kingdom, called the disciples, set up the Church, and sent out the apostles, so establishing a tradition to which we are the rightful heirs, needing only to preserve the forms we know.

But to stay there would be very short-sighted of us! We need to reflect on the fact that we are the ones who have just been celebrating his birth and baptism, giving special emphasis (as we Eastern Christians like to do) to the word "today": "Today the Virgin gives birth to the transcendent one;" "Today Christ is baptized in the Jordan." Well, if all this is "today," then it is also today that Christ departs from those who were present at his birth and baptism. That is, he departs from us, to begin his ministry.

How it is that we, who claim to have been celebrating all of this, now find ourselves deprived of what we thought we had? The Gospels put us in this position continuously and in various ways. The disciples, who had been with him from the beginning, are the ones who deny him at the moment of trial; the first shall be last and the last first

Our own self-confidence, having been present at his birth and baptism, is undermined. Christ has departed from us to begin his ministry. Yet we are not left in this position. For if Christ has to depart from us to begin his ministry, then we are in a position to be addressed by Christ, to hear what he has to say-for this is also addressed to us, today. It is the sinners that Christ has come to call, not the righteous.

This is the second point today's reading makes. Christ departs to those who sat in darkness to preach the Kingdom; it is for those who sit in the region and shadow of death that light has dawned. Only those in darkness need light. The light that is being spoken of is clearly not a physical light. It is, rather, a spiritual light, the light of the knowledge of God, and life in communion with him as made available in and through Christ.

But if this is the light being spoken of, one can be sure that those sitting in darkness did not realize that they were in darkness; they would have said that they see things perfectly clearly. It is only in the light that Christ brings that those who sit in the darkness of sin and death can realize that they are sitting in darkness. This light has only just begun to dawn on us; only having witnessed Christ's birth and Theophany do we now realize how far off we are from him.

There is a general law of the spiritual life. We do not begin with an awareness of our own situation, our own sinfulness, and then come to Christ as the answer to our problems. If we try to do that we will surely both misdiagnose the problem and create a savior in our own image. Rather, we begin with Christ, who shows us the truth both about God and about ourselves, so that we can come, as it said in the Epistle, "to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ." The particular pattern for this fullness of life is made abundantly clear in the teachings of Christ which follow on from today's reading - the Sermon on the Mount.

When Christ begins to preach, his message is simple: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Repent! Not simply "be sorry," but convert, reorient your lives.

To do so requires both reflection and action: reflection, to know where it is that we should be going, and action, to begin to take steps in that direction. Most importantly, there is no time to lose, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand.

So, let us pray that we don't delay, but rather give heed to the proclamation of Christ addressed to us, so that we also may come to stand in the light.

Mission Statement

Mysteries of Initiation (Baptism, Chrismation & Eucharist): Must be a registered, active.

Saint John the Baptist Byzantine Catholic Cathedral is a member of the

Mystery of Crowning: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish family.

Must meet with Fr. Andrew before setting date and reserving your banquet hall. Pre-Cana program is required and three sessions with Fr. Andrew. The ceremony will be celebrated according to the prescription of the liturgical book of the Byzantine rite.

Mystery of Reconciliation: Celebrated Saturdays, 4:00 PM - 4:30 PM and upon request.

Mystery of Anointing: Celebrated upon request. Ideally celebrated in Church the Sunday before undergoing any surgical or other medical procedure. **Visitation of the Sick:** The parishioners confined to their homes or nursing homes due to health

reasons are visited monthly. Also, persons who are hospitalized are visited when Fr. Andrew is notified. It especially is important that a family member contact Fr. Andrew whenever a loved-one is hospitalized.

Funerals: Families of the deceased or the funeral director must contact Fr. Andrew before setting and publishing the day and time of the funeral.

Parish Membership: We welcome anyone to become a parishioner of St. John the Baptist Cathedral Parish. Only those who are registered are considered members of the Parish. When one registers to become a parish member they assume the responsibility of rendering stewardship of time, talent and treasure to this parish family. Worship at this parish is always expected. Registration is done only through the pastor by appointment. The Parish Office should be notified as soon as possible of any change of address within the Parish as well as one's leaving.

Godparent/Sponsor Letters: Must be a registered, active, supporting member of the parish.

Rectory Office Hours: Judy is in the parish office Monday – Friday from 8:30 AM – 1:30 PM.

Father Andrew is available on other days and times by appointment.
