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Thomas Sunday Acts 5: 12-20 John 20: 19-31

Spring affects our lives. Lawns are cleared and mowed. Storm windows get replaced by screens. Snow tires are put in storage. Houses are aired out as part of the spring cleaning ritual. Bulbs planted last autumn bloom, along with flowers planted this spring. More and more time is spent outside. While inside we hear the outside sounds of children playing and birds singing. There is an unmistakable newness, freshness, cleanness in the air, as scents captured by winter are slowly freed.

Has Pascha likewise affected our lives? Has our heart been warmed along with the yawning sun? Does the light of our Christian witness shine along with the Paschal candle? Is there a certain sweetness in our being that joins with the newly released fragrance of last spring? Hopefully, the answer to at least some of the above will be "yes."

For those who have not sacrificed during Great Lent, for those who have not hungered for God's love and mercy, there is little joy at Pascha. Even for those who have made a sincere effort during the Lenten preparation, and for whom the Resurrection has been a moving experience, there is always the danger of the darkening, cooling-off period following Easter. The manifestation of this danger is liturgically expressed in the Gospel reading for the second Sunday of Pascha -St. Thomas Sunday.

All of the twelve apostles knew that Christ was the Messiah. Peter was speaking for the group when he confessed this belief. The doubt of Thomas was not about Christ's Divinity, but rather about his resurrection. We are familiar with the Gospel narration. Thomas believed, but only so far. How similar is our faith, or lack of faith, two thousand years later.

Now that we are in the midst of spring, it may be difficult to remember the snow-covered ground, frozen rivers, and arctic winds of not so long ago. So it was with the twelve when Christ, the sun of Righteousness, was in their midst. Just as a late winter storm challenges our belief in the coming of spring, so did Christ's arrest in Gethsemane and His Crucifixion on Golgotha challenge the faith of His disciples and plunge them into the cold darkness of fear and doubt. When He appeared to them during the evening of the First Easter Sunday, it was as if the sun rose in the middle of a snowstorm, to quiet the wind, melt the snow, and warm the earth.

Unfortunately, this belief may not go any further than the mental state. Our Christian experience may be no more than a series of poetic, cerebral expressions that we repeat countless times, without really understanding to the extent of our ability. We may be able

to remember and repeat the articles of the Creed, but are unable to explain them or relate them to our everyday lives. We need to feel our beliefs in our hearts as well as understand them in our minds. As the Fathers of the Church wrote, in the Philokalia, we should stand before God with our minds in our heart, without thoughts tempering our feelings, and our feelings giving life to our thoughts. This will happen as we seek the Kingdom of God and acquire the Holy Spirit.

Our one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church gives us many means to maintain Paschal joy. Every time we receive the Eucharist, especially on Sunday, we behold the Resurrection of Christ. Every time we confess our sins, we become brighter and warmer people. Whenever we pray, we make more room for God to live in us. Whenever we read the writings of the Fathers or the Lives of the Saints, we reinforce our belief that sanctity is very possible. Whenever we act according to God's commandments, by feeding His sheep, we do good to Christ as to the least of His flock. During the Paschal season, the Church calls for the reading of the Acts of the Apostles and the Gospel of John. Both of these books are very helpful in maintaining Paschal joy. The Acts help by fulfilling the Old Testament readings of Lent, as a sort of verbal and spiritual reward to those who endure and have faith. The Gospel of John underscores the living Presence of Christ, even

Yes, we do believe. We do have some faith, but we need to increase our faith, with God's help, every day of our lives. If Christ says that faith as much as a mustard seed can move a mountain, how small is our faith if we can't even move a coffee cup on a table/ However small our faith may be, it is nonetheless very real and has every potential to increase. We alone stand in the way of our spiritual growth. We have to ask for it and keep asking for it. We need to learn from our Church services. We need to pray and read Holy writings. We need to help our neighbor. We need to do these things more and more.

We need to confess, "Lord, I believe. Help my unbelief." We need to trust in God.

<u>Visitation of the Sick:</u> The parishioners confined to their homes or nursing homes due to health reasons are visited monthly. Also, persons who are hospitalized are visited when Fr. Andrew is notified. It especially is important that a family member contact Fr. Andrew whenever a loved-one is hospitalized.

<u>Funerals:</u> Families of the deceased or the funeral director must contact Fr. Andrew before setting and publishing the day and time of the funeral.

Parish Membership: We welcome anyone to become a parishioner of St. John the Baptist Cathedral Parish. Only those who are registered are considered members of the Parish. When one registers to become a parish member they assume the responsibility of rendering stewardship of time, talent and treasure to this parish family. Worship at this parish is always expected.
